

Last Sunday I used the illustration of my stepping away from the politics of our own denomination after the 2012 General Conference in my sermon. I didn't take the time to explain that decision beyond what was needed to illustrate my point in the sermon. However, I am going to explain that a bit more completely here.

In 2012, I was the treasurer for the Board of Directors of Reconciling Ministries Network. I had been in the position a few years at that point. It was an interesting time and place of service. Part of my service included spending time at the General Conference 2012 in Tampa, Florida. One year before this, I'd had my heart attack. I was still in cardiac rehab, so would walk the mile and a half each way as my cardio exercise while I was there. It gave me a fair bit of time to think and pray each morning and evening. In my daily Scripture readings during that period, 1 Corinthians was the assigned text. First Corinthians 2:2 stuck with me all through the General Conference: For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified.

I served until the end of 2012 at which time I stepped down from the RMN board and out of United Methodist denominational politics. I made that choice because of what I witnessed at the General Conference. I saw and heard people vilified, othered, and treated without dignity. I'm not going to tell stories or name names. This isn't the time or place for that. This is the place to share with you how that impacted me.

I found myself walking to the convention center each morning with hope and anticipation for the day ahead. The conversations and time spent building relationships with new and old friends alike. Each evening, I found myself walking back to the hotel (a Howard Johnson's no less!) wondering in prayer, "Why are we as we are to each other, O Lord?" There was kindness and generosity of spirit. There was a great amount of the worst of humanity, too. Perhaps I am too much of an idealist, but I don't want to participate in such grossly political gatherings no matter how heavily wrapped in hymns and scripture. My calling to ministry is clear to me, and it doesn't include such things as those. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified.

Stepping out of denominational politics for me is first and foremost about deciding not to judge the people I have known and loved as friends for near 40 years. We don't see eye-to-eye now. I'm ok with our not agreeing. I'm not ok with them not being my friend. Politics must be put aside. They are first and foremost my sibling in Christ. I refuse to let the broken politics of our denomination get in the way of that primary relationship — our siblinghood in Christ Jesus. I am an outlier among progressive and conservative United Methodists. Yet, I think I stand at the heart of our Wesleyan tradition. John Wesley and George Whitfield, an early Methodist preacher and a Calvinist, were at loggerheads theologically. It is reported the one said to the other, "I know your heart is with Christ, so let us join our hands and walk together," or some version thereof. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified.

You might call it a conversation experience. I name that experience as one which clarified my call to ministry further. It was part of the refiner's fire, to take an image from Isaiah. We are all called in some way. Our call may be to ministry, it may be to parenthood, it may be to our various professions. God calls us and continues to call us throughout or lives. For me, God used the General Conference of 2012 to clarify and refine my understanding of my calling to ministry. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. God is calling each of us in large and small ways. How is God inviting you to live today for the future God is preparing for you tomorrow?

Abraham and Sarah - Genesis 12:1-9

God made many promises in the Bible. The story of Abraham and Sarah is one of many stories about God's promise and people's faith in those promises. For the next few weeks, we will journey with Abraham and Sarah. Their journey will take them far away from home and bring many surprises.

God's Promise to Abraham - Genesis 12:1-9

God promised to be with Abraham as he journeyed to a new land. Abraham had faith in God, so he did as God asked. God told him to not be afraid, and that God would be his protector and his provider.

Abraham's Visitors - Genesis 18:1-14

Many years passed between the time Abraham and Sarah moved from their home in Haran until they arrived in the new land. During those years, they must have wondered how God was going to make a great nation out of them when they still didn't have any children.

Isaac Is Born - Genesis 21:1-7
