

Pastor's Pen

Before the last General Conference, I spent a lot of time in tears. I came to understand the meaning of the verb: to weep. My heart broke watching what was happening, reading things being written, hearing things said, and being personally vilified by folks whom I have known for over thirty years. I don't think they realized that they were attacking me personally, but nonetheless the harm was done. I have known some of these folks for nearly 40 years. Seminary classmates. Prayer partners. Friends. It was worse after traveling to Minneapolis for a gathering with the "progressives" where that leadership made it clear that some of us, of a certain age, were not truly welcome. The months before the last General Conference were incredibly difficult. The mutuality of Methodism with which I had been raised was being tested, tried, and seemed to be crumbling and breaking. My heart broke along with it. I was asking how I could continue to serve a denomination which seemingly didn't want me. How could I sing the song of faith in such a hostile environment?

I spent a long time in prayer and tears that Winter and Spring. With COVID in 2020, the General Conference was postponed. My tears and prayers continued all the way through the special session in 2022. The turning point came when I began to pray not for the situation generally but for each of those individuals I knew in leadership in the Wesley Covenant Association (WCA) and the General Methodist Church (GMC). These are the leaders who are leading individuals and congregations to disaffiliate from The United Methodist Church. I pray for them, my friends, by name each day still. Praying for them changes me.

I'm still hurt by things some of these folks have written and said. You can't vilify an entire class of people, in this case LGBTQIA+ folks, without also including me. I finally came to a decision: My friends may dislike me and vilify me, but to me they are still my friends. It took a very long time to work through all that I was thinking and feeling. In the end, there were two things I knew to be fact.

First, they were and are, at least to me, my friends. They may not consider me a friend, but I still consider them friends. I don't really care what they think. We were friends nearly 40 years ago in school. With one of them, I was his prayer partner. I have been praying for him as colleagues for all these years; I see no reason to stop now. I was prayer partners with another at a Congress on Evangelism thirty years ago. I have prayed for his ministry all these years; I see no reason to stop now. I was mentored by one who became pastor to me when I was very sick. I see no reason to stop praying for him now, either. They may consider me however they choose. At the end of the day, their opinion of me, or what they may think God's opinion of me is, doesn't matter. Rather, I know that I am loved and claimed by God. That is all that does matter. Paul's letter to the Romans reminds that there is nothing in life or death which can separate me from the love of God in Christ Jesus. They are my friends even if they choose not to see themselves that way; it's how I choose to see them.

Second, they were, as was I, baptized. Neither they nor the Church can take that back. Even if they don't like it, in those baptismal waters we were made siblings in Christ. There is no if, ands, or buts about it. This is what God has done and is doing. That is the nature of God's grace: God chooses us, it is not we who choose God. I cannot view this in any other way; it is the nature of grace. God's grace comes before we even know or realize it is there for us. They were baptized, too, just like me. Once the waters of baptism are applied, they can never be removed. Also, who are we to "remove" an outward and visible sign of what God is already doing (e.g.: actively gracing our lives)? God is doing this already without the sign of baptism in the first place! Baptism is something we do to remind ourselves of what God has already been doing! My friends want to qualify my baptism, limit what it means or can mean. I, on the other hand, see us as equal before God. I see each of us having a place at the Table. God

As we approach our General Conference gathering again this Spring, I'm not in tears this time. I'm hopeful for what can and will happen, although I have learned to not expect too much. My expectations are low, but I pray for everything and in particular those who would make me a second-class citizen in the reign of God. I invite you to join me over the next 180 days to pray for our General Conference and our coming Jurisdictional Conference. The General Conference will be setting the direction for how we will move forward. I expect there to be a special session of the General Conference in 2026 to work on these matters further. After General Conference concludes in early May, I'd invite you to begin praying for our Western Jurisdiction. Our bishop, Bishop Carcaño, retires this year. We will be served by a new bishop (new to us at least) beginning in the Fall. Your support in prayer for Bishop Carcaño as she prepares to retire from active service, and the coming election and appointment of bishops is needed. Join me in holding our church locally, regionally, and globally in prayer.

Jesus Washes Feet – John 13:1-17

Today we are exploring the story of Jesus washing the disciples' feet. As Jesus and his disciples are having a meal, Jesus kneels down and begins to wash the feet of his friends. This act typically is something done by a servant, so the disciples are surprised. Peter says to Jesus, "No! You will never wash my feet!" This is a strong response. But Jesus, who soon will be led to his death, has a purpose behind his actions.

March 10

The Last Supper – Luke 22:14-20

The Passover meal was celebrated each year to mark the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. Jesus and his disciples would have observed Passover many times throughout their lives. This year, the Passover meal with Jesus would be different from others, but they did not know that. During this meal, Jesus gave thanks for the bread and broke it and then took a cup and blessed it. Jesus used the bread and the cup, everyday items, to remind the disciples of his body (the bread) and his blood (the cup), given for them and for us. They have become symbols of God's love in Christian churches today.

March 17

Praying in the Garden – Luke 22:39-46 Our Bible story begins after Jesus and the disciples have shared the Last Supper and gone to the Garden of Gethsemane. While his disciples sleep—despite Jesus' instructions to pray—Jesus goes to pray. Jesus Enters Jerusalem – Matthew 21:1-11

Jesus Enters Jerusalem – Matthew 21:1-11

Today we experience the excitement of Jesus being welcomed into Jerusalem, even as we know that this week in Jerusalem will result in his death. In Luke 18:31-33, Jesus told his friends, the disciples, that he would be killed in Jerusalem. Jesus and his friends knew as they entered Jerusalem that Jesus' life on earth was short.

March 31

Resurrection – Matthew 28:1-10

Happy Resurrection Day! In today's story, women are the first to find the empty tomb. They do not come to anoint Jesus' body, like in Mark; they come to see the tomb. Some argue this is because they remembered Jesus' teachings about his resurrection and wanted to see if God's promise had been fulfilled.

Kids will stay in church with their families for the Easter Celebration.



Confirmation is traditionally the time in the life of our youth when they look closely at what it means to be a Christian in general, to be a United Methodist in particular, and to be a member of Los Gatos UMC specially. It is a great time to explore their faith, grapple with some of the tough questions facing them and their generation (and facing all people of faith), and to get to know themselves and their church a bit better. The word "confirmation" is used because for students who were baptized as infants or children, this class invites them to decide whether to "confirm" the vows made on their behalf at their baptism.

Students do not have to decide about church membership prior to joining the confirmation class. In fact, we would prefer that they come with an open mind - ready to explore the issues and learn more, but waiting to make their final decision about membership until they have taken part in the class.

Confirmation classes will be held on Sunday mornings, March 10, through May 12 from 11:30AM-12:30PM. We will have a snack lunch and fellowship during this time. After these classes, students are invited, but not pressured, to make their personal decisions about membership. The confirmation Service is on Pentecost Sunday, May 19, 10AM service.




Welcome
